What WP is an how it differs from other Content Management Systems:

From it's humble origins, WordPress has grown into a full-fledged content management system, or CMS, that powers millions of websites all over the world, from traditional blogs to newspapers, online magazines, TV stations, nations, and social media sites. WordPress powers everything. To put it simply, WordPress is a publishing tool for the Web. So to me at least, the answer to the question "What is WordPress?" is WordPress is whatever you want it to be.

WordPress has a strong presence on the web with over 1 million active websites. You don't need to know coding but you do need to know a few tricks to make the most out of this powerful platform. In this class you will set up a home page, create navigation, customize pages, create a blog, learn to install plugins, create new users, and learn how to keep your site safe and secure.

Creating posts and pages Posts vs. Pages – what is the difference?

Posts

- News / updates
- Blog, Magazine or a news site
- Publish and article, news item, a photo or a video it's generally in a post. Posts are easy to identify because the most recent posts appear at the top.
- Organized by date, author, categories, and tags
- Available to search by categories: date, author, tags etc. (indexing)
- Comments and Social Links

Pages

- Permanent Information
- Organized in parent / child relationships (seen in menus)
- Available through menus
- Usually no comments

Creating Posts

- Titles helps to organize and find it later.
- WP saves iterations so if you lose connection you haven't lost everything.
- If typing in another editor and copying and pasting into WP use the "Paste as Text"
- Save as Draft so it won't be public until you want it to be.
- Preview on publish panel or link at top of page or at the bottom of the post.

Using categories and tags

Categories

- Main organizing tool every post must belong to one category.
- Broad topic that bring group posts together.
- Use categories to relate to one another when they belong to the same group. Example: Jackets, pants, shirts, dresses, etc.

Tags

- Associative organizing tool you don't have to use tags at all.
- Relational topics that loosely bind content together
- Good example would be looking at the actual tag in your cloths Example: brand, material, color

- To the left there is a "Create Gallery" in the menu
- Upload images
- Slideshow view

Using Featured Image

- Associate one image within your post or page
- Displays separately from the gallery
- Featured image is found at the bottom right

Adding media from YouTube

- Place cursor where you want the video
- Go to YouTube and copy the link from the browser, the http://.... (URL)
- Save and Preview changes.
